- <u>MENTORSHIP AND TRAINING</u>: 50% of YP's feel they are not receiving the training they require; Lack of structured training and strong mentors; Fast-track project mind-set limiting training opportunities; 70% believe their tertiary education prepared them for a career in Engineering.

- <u>REMUNERATION</u>: Only 9% would study towards a different career, for improved remuneration, given a second chance.

- <u>CAREER DEVELOPMENT</u>: 93% of respondents are proud of what they do.

All in a all a well attended, fruitful session for all who attended the conference. We look forward to the 2014 conference which will be held in Limpopo.
